As we pass from Thanksgiving into the December holidays, I am reminded that thankfulness is not a seasonal phenomenon. We may focus our attention on what we are thankful for in late November and extend it a bit through the month of December, but being aware of the gifts we've been given has to be something we're cognizant of every day. After all, the good things we've been given are often serendipity; they've been bestowed whether we deserve them or not.

By simply being "Friends" we've chosen to form a bond around the very special place we know as Brooker Creek Preserve. No one has strong-armed us into banding together. It was a choice we've all made individually and by forming this bond we have made a visible difference to a place unlike any other in this region of Florida. Each day, month and year those differences are registered and made observable. The buildings and the programs that emerge from them are made possible by us. The land management initiatives have their roots because of us and the mere fact that hundreds to thousands of visitors get to take a walk in real Florida and come to appreciate that is largely because of what we do. I am thankful that all of you care enough to make this happen and that you've cared enough over decades. We've built an impressive legacy together.

I am thankful that government in its many forms has committed itself to purchasing and then managing this land. What was once barely more than 3,500 acres, that included a great many acres of disturbed land, was grown to include nearly 6,000 more; most of which was naturally vegetated. It's been a long road, however, to restore a great many parts to a more-natural condition.



Because of government, Brooker Creek Preserve spilled out over significant acres in Hillsborough County as well. We don't always give recognition to that. I do not know the total current acreage of the Brooker Creek Preserve complex, but it includes at least 2,000 additional acres in Hillsborough. All of this is protected and managed. In a region this developed, putting that many acres into conservation is significant.

I am simply thankful that the great diversity of plant and animal species that made this region their home before this crazy development pressure set in can still find habitat after all that has occurred. Species common elsewhere in Florida, like whitetailed deer and turkey, have their last real stronghold within the conservation lands of Brooker Creek Preserve. The last bobwhite quail and eastern meadowlark in Pinellas County still reside here and listed species like pine lilies and snowy orchids have a place here too. Our region's natural heritage is preserved only within the boundaries of the Brooker Creek Preserve complex.

Each of us is engaged in all of this regardless of our actual roles within the Friends. We remain relevant and effective because all of us are members. Thank you for that. Reach out to those around you in 2024 and help us grow even larger.






Nature Store News - Free Trees for Arbor Day!

Beekeepers Club News

What a great experience we had on Sunday, January 7 extracting honey! We had a nice big group to share the work; from trekking to the apiary to get the honey supers, to setting up the extraction equipment in the auditorium kitchen and labelling the jars, to cleaning up at the end (it's a sticky undertaking.) The total jar count was 98, so we almost tied our record of 100 jars.

If you would like some honey, you can purchase it in our Nature Store. \$10/jar, limit 2 per person. But don't wait too long...it always sells out really quickly!

Store hours are Thur-Sat 9 am- 4 pm and Sun.. 11 am-4 pm.



The hive frames were transferred into the Brooker Creek Kitchen where club members used hot knives to slice off the honeycomb caps (below). Then the frames, 12 at a time, were placed into an electronic spinner (left), where honey was separated from the honeycomb by centrifugal force. A spout at the bottom of the spinner (bottom left) allowed honey to pour out, then through a sieve that removed all wax bits.





News from the Wildflower Garden

The garden is basically asleep for the winter. There might be a random flower still in bloom, but most of the plants are producing seeds to feed our birds and for next year's growth. As I mentioned last month, leaving the seeds and stalks over the winter helps to feed birds and serve as a space inside hollow stems for insects to mature.

Our next workday will be January 27th from 9:00 - 11:00 am. We meet the last Saturday of each month except November and December due to the holidays.

We are always looking for new volunteers to help maintain the Wildflower Garden. If you would like to join us, please register by emailing Pam at <u>pamperedgardeners@gmail.com</u>. Due to the fragility of the plants in the garden, we limit the number to five volunteers, including any children 10 or more years old. Bring your gardening tools, gloves, hat, and bug repellant, and wear closed-toed shoes. We will provide a light snack.

Pam's Thoughts

Many people put out bird feeders and seed to feed the birds, especially during the winter. I prefer to feed the birds by planting Florida native plants that produce lots of berries and seeds. I have had bad luck with feeders and raccoons. Plus, I am basically inattentive to making sure

there is seed in the feeders. Some of the natives that can provide copious berries or seeds to feed the birds that I have in my landscape are:

American Beautyberry (*Callicarpa americana*) is a medium to large sized shrub that produces clusters of pink blooms along the stems that mature to magenta berries that birds love. This plant takes pruning well to control size. Be aware that pruning can decrease the bloom and berries.

Wild Coffee (*Psychotria nervosa*) is a fairly large shrub that produces white blooms followed by red berries. Pruning to control the size can affect the bloom and number of berries.



Female Yaupon Holly (Ilex vomitoria) is an evergreen shrub or tree with flowers that bloom in spring and attract a variety of bees and other insects. In the fall the abundant small bright red fruit provides food for birds and small mammals. The dense evergreen foliage provides yearround cover for wildlife. I recommend buying the tree in the fall to assure that it is a female bearing fruit, since holly plants are either male or female plants.



Simpson's Stopper (*Myrcianthes fragrans*) is a shrub to small tree that takes pruning well, but as mentioned for the other plants, pruning can affect blooming and fruiting. The showy, fragrant white flowers appear in spring and are followed by orange to red berries in late summer and early fall. This plant is great for attracting butterflies, bees,

and birds. Simpson's stopper is a threatened plant species and is listed on the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' threatened list. With this status, it is always important to obtain plants from a reputable nursery and *never* from the wild.

I also have a number of native wildflowers that provide seeds in the fall for a variety of birds.

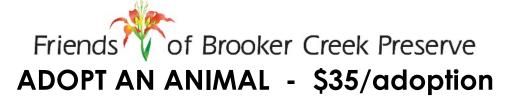
