Plein Air 2022 Weekend at Brooker Creek Preserve



All of the paintings celebrate the beauty of the natural landscape of Brooker Creek, and we thank the plein air artists who participated. On Sunday a nicely attended reception and awards program was held (thank you Julie Wade for arranging the decorations and refreshments).

Plein Air artist Joseph Weinzettle, who recently had an exhibition in the Auditorium Gallery, served as the show's judge. Awards were given for Best in Show to our own volunteer extraordinaire, Jane Myers, First Prize to Rachel Harris, Second Prize to Bill Williamson, and Awards of Merit to artists Kathy Detrano, Emily Lazarou, and Jana Withers. RECENT DONATIONS

At the take-down of Joseph Weinzettle's exhibition *Swamps of North Pinellas County, Plein Air Drawings and Paintings*, the artist surprised us with his desire to donate two major pieces from the show to the Friends of Brooker Creek Preserve Art Collection: *Mitigation Area, Mornings* and the triptych *Cypress Interior*. Joe praised the opportunity to exhibit at Brooker Creek saying: "To display contemporary fine art in a natural environment like Brooker Creek is a perfect match for my art and revives America's artistic roots, represented by George Inness and the Hudson River School artists."

The greatest joy I get from leading walks as part of the Off the Beaten Path series is revisiting my favorite parts of the Preserve that are now not open to me or the general public. The second is seeing "old" friends and making new ones while sharing this experience with all of them. Brooker Creek Preserve has so many wild and beautiful places within its vast acreage, but none are more scenic than the four we visit each year as part of this series.



I must give credit to Barb Hoffman for naming each. I have never been that creative. The Sandhill Scramble is certainly hers, and aptly named. There are tiny pockets within the main part of the Preserve that could qualify as sandhill, though needing some restoration to be clearly seen as such. The sandhill area north of Keystone Road, however, is in pretty good shape. Sandhills occur on ridges of deep sandy soils and are characteristically dominated by wiregrass (*Aristida stricta*) in the understory and widely scattered longleaf pines (*Pinus palustris*) in the canopy. Less dominant are turkey and bluejack oaks (*Quercus laevis* and *Q. incana*, respectively). There are few saw palmetto (*Serenoa repens*) in the understory like there are in a pine flatwoods so walking off trail is easy, and in that understory of wiregrass are a great diversity of other grasses and wild-flowers. Of all the many plant communities found at Brooker Creek Preserve, sandhill is my favorite.

It was a perfect day to explore this area. The spring weather was just warm enough and just not humid as much as it would be later in the season. Our intrepid group included folks of all age groups and there was a sense of expectation as we walked north on the trail through some beautiful flatwoods and towards the sandhill area. When we reached it, we left the trail and wandered through the sandhill habitat. Few of the sky-blue lupine (*Lupinus diffusus*) remained in bloom, but other wildflowers greeted us as we walked. Wild blueberries (*Vaccinium* spp.) also were coming into flower. This area is some of the best habitat in Brooker Creek Preserve for gopher tortoise and we walked by a great many burrows.

Some of these may still harbor the rare gopher frogs that require the burrows for their survival. Perhaps also the commensal Florida mouse or an indigo or pine snake. Not all the mysteries of the Preserve are fully known.

On our way back to our vehicles, we stopped and walked a short distance off trail to get a better look at one of the larger cypress strands that interconnect with the uplands here - at Barb Hoffman's request. The view was spectacular and I believe all of us left with a much better appreciation of the diverse beauty that is Brooker Creek Preserve.

Each year, the Friends lead hikes to four areas of the Preserve not open to the public - the Off the Beaten Path series. They are important revenue sources for us, but more importantly they give us a chance to share some of the Preserve's most special places with all of you. I encourage you to join us. Our next walk is Sunday, July 17, where we will explore some of the Preserve's wet interior pinelands. We are likely to get wet feet and shins so come prepared. These wet pinelands and marshes, however, are stunning. You can make a reservation by going to the Friends website and searching for the Off the Beaten Path hikes.

If you recall, we held the first one last fall in place of our Fall Wildflower Festival, thinking that this smaller-scale event was more fitting given the Covid situation. That first one was a success, making about \$800 for the Friends after expenses. And that happened in less than three hours! At this most recent Native Plant Sale we sold more plants in the same amount of time and made \$1229! As always, this could only happen because of a great team of volunteers!

Thanks to **Lisa Boing** who used her knowledge of native plants to put together a stellar list of plants, which were then picked up from Sweet Bay Nursery on the other side of the Skyway Bridge by Lisa, and **Cathy Vogelsong and her son Zachary** the afternoon before the sale. We appreciate that **Sweet Bay Nursery** worked with us once again. They always have such a wonderful selection of great looking plants! Thanks to **Mona Gardner and Dixie Mills** who painstakingly wrote out price tags for about 250 plants ahead of time. Many, many thanks to both the Friday volunteer crew who were ready and waiting to help our deliverers unload and price those 250 plants, set up canopies and tables and haul jugs of water. Hats off as well, to the Saturday crew who set out plants, set up and manned the sales table, hauled jugs of water (again - plants get thirsty, too) and to our own native plant experts who were on hand to offer advice to our patrons. So, in addition to those mentioned above (and who were there both Friday and Saturday), the following people were also invaluable in making this such a great event:

2020 OFF THE BEATEN PATH

A nature-based fundraising hike series

Description: This series of four hikes will take place in beautiful areas tucked away within Brooker Creek Preserve in sites that are closed to the public. Our guide, Dr. Craig Huegel (SPC Biology Professor), can identify everything, from the tiniest moss to the tallest tree including animal prints, bird calls, lichens, and more. He is full of stories and very patient in answering questions. The hikes will be educational, and a lot of fun as well! The hikes will begin at 9:00 am, and be about 3-4 hours long. Bring water and lunch.

Cost: \$80 donation for the series of four hikes or \$25 donation per hike, with a 10% discount for members of Friends of Brooker Creek Preserve.

Sept. 26, 2021 – In Search of Catesby’s Lily – Located in the eastern part of the preserve, we will search for the threatened Catesby’s Lily. In so doing, we will see a profusion of beautiful fall wildflowers in full bloom.

Dec. 12, 2021 - Cypress Swamp Stomp – Located in the central part of the Preserve, this site features orchids, ferns, and epiphytes. Plan to get wet, or maybe not get wet, as we plunge into the depths of the swamp!

March 20, 2022 – Sandhill Scramble – The only true sandhills of Brooker Creek Preserve. This site is in the northern end of the preserve and will feature an abundance of spring wildflowers.

*** July 17, 2022 – Interior Wildlands** – We will be in parts of the Preserve so remote that cell phones won’t work, areas so pretty you won’t believe you are in Pinellas County!

News from the Wildflower Garden, By Pam Brown

In February we planted some tiny seedlings of narrowleaf sunflower that I brought in from my garden to fill in some of the space where we removed muhly grass in January. Unfortunately, they did not survive so I provided some additional seedlings that we planted in March. Dixie Mills and Mona Gardener donated Stokes aster and coreopsis that we will plant at our April workday. Hopefully this should finish filling in the bare areas. The lyreleaf sage has been blooming along with some of the coreopsis, brightening up the garden for spring. We also saw a rainlily that bloomed after some rain.



Our next workdays will be May 28th and June 25th. We are now observing our summer work hours: 8:00 - 10:00 am. If you would like to join us, please register by emailing me at pamperedgardeners@gmail.com. Due to the fragility of the plants in the garden, we limit the number of volunteers to five workers, including children 10 years or older. Bring your gardening tools, gloves, hat, and bug repellent, and wear closed-toed shoes. We will provide a light snack along with coffee and tea.

Pam's Thoughts

Are you looking for drought tolerant, almost care free flowers that will bloom all through our hot, humid summer in full sun? Blanketflower (*Gaillardia pulchella*) will be a good choice. It is a Florida native that re-seeds readily so that you always have fresh plants. The two-inch-wide flowers come in yellow, orange, red, or bicolors that are attractive to butterflies, and they make excellent, long-lasting cut flowers. Each plant can grow one to two feet tall and up to three feet wide. They look wonderful in mass plantings, are salt tolerant, and pest free. What more could you ask of a wildflower?


